Build your **child's** skill set before kindergarten



These skills do not need to be mastered before entering Kindergarten.

Social-Emotional

- Follows routine
- Dresses self
- Brushes teeth
- Cares for own belongings
- Puts toys away
- Helps with family chores
- Talks easily
- Asks for help
- Expresses self verbally
- Joins in family conversations
- Recognizes authority
- Practices self-control and understands personal space
- Gets along well with others
- Uses bathroom independently/ uses a Kleenex independently
- Separates from parents
- Works independently
- Looks forward to going to school

Colors and Shapes

- Recognizes basic colors
- Recognizes basic shapes

Time

- Understands day and night
- Knows age and birthday

Motor Skills

- Runs
- Walks a straight line
- Jumps with both feet off ground
- Hops with one foot
- Stands on one foot for 10 seconds
- Claps hands
- Throws a ball
- Carries a plate of food
- Draws and cuts simple shapes
- Controls pencil and crayon
- Holds scissors correctly
- Pastes pictures on paper
- Builds with blocks
- Buttons clothes
- Zips clothes
- Completes a simple puzzle
- Draws/colors beyond a simple scribble

Numbers

- Counts to 10
- Counts objects to 10
- Recognizes some written numbers

Comparisons

- Big and Little
- Short and Tall
- Heavy and Light

Reading Readiness

- Pretends to read
- Looks at pictures and tells a story
- Understands words are read from left to right
- Retells simple story in sequence
- Recognizes own first name in writing
- Prints own first name
- Familiar with the letters and sounds in their name
- Knows difference between a letter and a number
- Knows some nursery rhymes

Listening and Sequencing

- Pays attention
- Sits still during story
- Follows simple verbal directions

Knowledge

- Basic body parts
- Own first and last name
- Parents' names
- Home address
- Home telephone number
